Regarding Designated Bathing Water Status at Conham River Park

July-October 2021

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Introduction

The Conham Bathing Water Group is a group of volunteers seeking water quality enhancement and protection for the (Bristol) River Avon at Conham River Park.

Over July-September 2021, we conducted a public survey to determine whether people use Conham River Park / Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve as a public swimming spot and what they think about regular water quality testing and awarding the area Designated Bathing Water Status.


Here, we provide an overview of the results with a brief discussion on what they indicate.



Location



The proposed bathing site is a stretch of the River Avon just outside Bristol city centre, with Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve on one bank and Conham River Park on the other.



Quick explainer:

What is Designated Bathing Water Status?

Essentially, Designated Bathing Water Status (DBWS) is an official way of recognising that a body of water (whether a beach, lake, or river) is a popular site for swimming, paddling, and other water-based activities.

Currently there are two rivers in the UK with DBWS: the River Wharfe in Yorkshire, and the River Thames in Oxfordshire.

Achieving DBWS means that each year over the "peak bathing season" (May-September), the Environment Agency will test the site for pollutants, including the bacteria *Escherichia coli* (E.coli) and *Intestinal enterococci*. The EA publishes annual reports of all designated bathing waters and classifies them as "Excellent", "Good", "Sufficient", or "Poor".

Crucially, for any DWBS sites that don't meet regulatory standards, the EA will investigate the sources of pollution to identify remedial measures.

A Yorkshire river has become the first in the country to be given special 'bathing' status, meaning the water will be regularly tested to ensure it is clean and safe enough for swimmers.



Visiting the site


& mode of transport

96% of our survey respondents said that they had previously been to Conham River Park / Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve, which suggests that the vast majority of respondents are directly impacted by the area's designation of bathing water status.

The responses further show that the area is well-frequented, with 55% of respondents visiting at least once a month.



Mode of transport





Travel to Conham River Park by bike or foot

The majority of respondents travel to the area by bike or by foot (70%). This high figure is particularly interesting as active transport only accounts for 30% of total journeys in the city of Bristol, suggesting that a large proportion of respondents reside locally. Car journeys come in third with 27.1%. Only 1.8% visit the area by bus.

Furthermore, 25.6% of those who visit the area go with children they care for, extending the public health implications beyond adults and adolescents, to children too.







Water quality

How important is it?


We asked how important it is that the River Avon is clean enough for paddling, swimming, and other water-based activities. 86.3% felt it was extremely important (see the figure to the right).

We further asked respondents to speculate what impact it would have on the City of Bristol if the River Avon was too polluted for water-based activities such as swimming.

The most common themes mentioned were impacts on: physical and mental health, the environment, access to nature, Bristol's reputation, and local businesses.

"Aside from the catastrophic impact on wildlife and plants, it will have an impact on humans. Restricting our ability to move (swim), and making open water swimming a risky and out of the ordinary activity might lead to further ill health and depression, when healthy river systems could in fact help alleviate these problems."

Around 86% of respondents said they don't feel well informed about the water quality at this site.

A number of respondents indicated that they are, in fact, well informed but specified in one of the narrative responses that they feel confident about how bad the water quality is.

Water quality testing

Given the uncertainty surrounding the quality of the water, it is perhaps unsurprising that 98.1% (93.9% strongly) support regular water quality testing of the river stretch.

Of the respondents who oppose, the reasons mentioned included concerns about financial costs, increased littering in the area, and illegal parking. One person stated that they simply don't believe that results will actually be published.

With Designated Bathing Water Status, the Environment Agency would conduct regular water quality monitoring over the peak bathing season, meaning the public would be more informed. 98.1%

Of the overwhelming majority that support testing, 742 people provided an explanation of their support.

Most of the responses had significant thematical overlaps, but most commonly the following topics were mentioned:

"I want to know whether it is safe for my children and I to swim there."




& other water activities

Out of all 902 respondents, 91.6% indicated that they go wild swimming, with 693 saying they swim in the area of Conham River Park / Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve.

Responding to a separate question, 82% of respondents who visit this site said they go swimming or undertake other water-based activities such as paddle-boarding.



Water quality concerns when swimming

Of the 156 respondents who visit this site but don't go swimming, 83% avoid the water due to water quality concerns.

This is unsurprising given the current lack of information felt by our respondents (see page 7) and the worrying reports about people getting sick after entering the water without this crucial knowledge.



Interestingly, 95% of people who have been swimming here are concerned about the water quality – but take the dip regardless.

This indicates that concerns are not enough to deter people from swimming, only information can equip them with the necessary toolkit to make decisions to protect them and, in some cases, the health of their children.








Unfortunately, our survey quantitatively validates the concerns of our respondents. 41% have been ill after being in the river, 15% of which are sure that the water was the cause of this.

Many people therefore feel the need to take precautions – such as keeping their head above the surface – when entering the water.

Bathing water status

in favour or opposed?

An overwhelming 95.7%, i.e., 863 respondents support awarding Conham River Park / Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve Designated Bathing Water Status.

Out of the few who don't, the explanations include worries about financial burdens upon the residents, insufficient parking, and the current lack of facilities.

It is clear, even from those who aren't in favour of wild swimmers, that the spot is highly frequented which is well-known by everyone in the area. As such, it is crucial that this is recognised to ensure the safety of everyone who bathes in the river – adults and children alike.

If awarded, the Avon could become the third river in England with a designated bathing water, following the Rivers Wharf and Thames!




Demographics

of our survey respondents

Overall, 902 people responded to the survey, 95% of whom described themselves as local residents*. There were also a few who only visited the area (31) as well as two previous and one prospective Bristol residents. 13 respondents were also local business owners, highlighting the importance of this topic beyond leisure.



95% of respondents live in the Bristol area




Gender identity of respondents

Out of the 870 who answered, 66% are female, 32% male and 2.6% identify outside of the gender binary.

The majority of respondents are aged 25-34 (47%) followed by those aged 35-44 (24%) (see chart below).

Further, 90% of respondents indicated that they are White (British/non-British) – an overrepresentation compared to the general population statistics of the city (84%). However, 6.1% chose not to answer this question, which may explain this slight discrepancy. 3.9% indicated to belong to the BAME population.

Finally, 5.5% of respondents considered themselves disabled, 90.8% did not and 3.7% preferred not to say.

Concluding remarks

Our survey shows there is considerable public support for an application of Designated Bathing Water Status at Conham River Park / Eastwood Farm Nature Reserve.

The site is frequently visited by our respondents, and most often on foot or by bike (p. 6).

The vast majority of respondents swim, or have swum, at this site (p.9), despite concerns regarding the quality of the water. In fact, most said they don't feel well informed about the water quality (p.7) and almost all support regular quality monitoring here (p.8). In their narrative responses, people mentioned health and safety conerns, physical and mental health, and protecting nature and wildlife.
